## President's Message

As this issue of *The Diamond* arrives on your desk or is accessed online, Lambda Sigma Nation is in the midst of the selection process for 2015-2016 chapter members. It is time to thank and congratulate the outgoing chapter for its accomplishments this past year in scholarship, leadership, and service. During this transition, here are a few tasks to keep in mind to wrap up 2014-2015 and launch the new chapter off to a successful start:

- ◆ Make sure to conduct a comprehensive membership process for new chapter members. Make sure to recruit candidates that are representative of the variety of majors, backgrounds, and demographic groups at your institution, as well as the diversity of your campus.
- ◆ Follow the procedure your chapter outlined for the membership process in the Rituals Report filed in January.
- ◆ Chapters vary in size from 15 to 50 members. Strive to include all students who show promise of representing the four pillars of Lambda Sigma – Scholarship, Leadership, Fellowship, and Service.
- ◆ Inform new members of the benefits and expectations of membership before they make the financial and time commitment to join.
- ◆ Plan an initiation ceremony, which includes the national ritual and honors the initiates.

I also want to encourage the *current chapter* to accomplish the following:

- ◆ Nominate a candidate from your chapter for a National Lambda Sigma Scholarship.

- ◆ Consider whether your chapter should be eligible for Honor Chapter status, and build a case in the year-end reports.
- ◆ Make sure that the chapter president, advisor(s), and treasurer complete their reports by the appropriate deadlines.
- ◆ Elect strong junior advisors, if this is a tradition for your chapter.
- ◆ Arrange for a successful transition between the current executive board and the incoming officers.
- ◆ Make sure that membership fees, the conference assessment, and a scholarship donation are paid to national Lambda Sigma before the close of the year.
- ◆ Inform the new president that he or she will represent the chapter at the annual Presidents Conference to be held September 25-27 at Middle Tennessee State University in Murfreesboro, TN.

## Alpha Member Exemplifies Leadership, Scholarship, Service and Fellowship

Meet Wesley Starnes, a dedicated member of the Alpha chapter of Lambda Sigma at the University of Pittsburgh. Prior to coming to the University of Pittsburgh and being inducted into Lambda Sigma, Starnes lived in a town just outside of Philadelphia.

One day at church, Starnes overheard a young girl with leukemia telling her mother that during her chemotherapy appointments, which last six to seven hours, she would read. Unfortunately, during just one appointment, she read every book the hospital had to offer in their library.

Starnes and his mother took the initiative to start collecting books to donate to duPont Hospital where the girl went for her treatments. He sent out a notice to all of his neighbors to inform them that for Halloween, rather than asking for candy, he would trick-or-treat for used children's books. He collected over a thousand books!

When he went to the hospital to deliver these books, he was told that they could not accept any more books because there was no more room for them. It was then that Starnes discovered the charity Reach Out and Read.

Reach Out and Read gives gently used books to kids when they go to the hospital for well visits. Every child in the family is given a book in an attempt to improve the literacy rate in the inner city of Philadelphia.

Starnes continued to collect books, receiving donations from people throughout his town. He then took the books to the Children's Hospital of Philadelphia where Reach Out and Read operates. He continued to collect books throughout his high school years; sponsoring book drives through his school's Key Club.

In his senior year, Starnes was honored at a lunch sponsored by Reach Out and Read, as over the years, he had donated over thirty thousand books!

We are so proud to have Starnes in our Lambda Sigma chapter. He exemplifies scholarship with his studies of Psychology, Sociology and Neuroscience. He is a true leader in many ways, but specifically for collecting so many books for Reach Out and Read. His commitment to service is outstanding, indicated before he even entered college. And as for fellowship, he is a great friend and inspiration not only to the rest of the Lambda Sigma members, but to everyone who has the pleasure of meeting him. ♦

While his experience is inspiring, other members have brought us exciting news. Our membership chairs, Michelle Hernedo and Yuanheng Wang, created the Behrend Appreciation Day activity in which they encouraged each member to make thank-you cards for their most appreciated faculty and staff member at Behrend. Secretary Rachel Rattay and

Fundraising Chair Allison Steinmetz and others organized the Warm Up for Children activity in which they hand-knitted more than 50 blankets for hospitalized children in Erie. Abigail Johnston, our service chair, along with other members made and sent more than 100 Christmas cards to soldiers through out the nation.


Partnering with a different organization each month the Iota chapter has helped multiple university and community organizations during the fall semester. Saturdays before football games the chapter came together with other
