After her mom struggled with a bout of breast cancer from 2020 until 2022, Alexandra formed a desire to serve others in a similar situation. She was approached by Care-to-Share, an organization that supports and serves local cancer patients, her first year at Pittsburg State University to start a group on campus. In the past year, the chapter she co-founded was able to table in the university oval to collect donations and give out awareness ribbons. They raised \$225, which was presented to the family of a local two-year-old cancer patient at a bake sale in which the organization helped run to raise support in Ft. Scott.

This is a prime example of the initiative being taken by the Lambda Sigma members at Pittsburg State University. The Omega chapter has had several member meetings and service projects this year already. The chapter has painted affirmational sayings on rocks that were placed around campus to spread a little light in the darker days of midterms for students. They have also packaged bags of candy and provided them to local children at the PSU Trunk-or-Treat, which provided the local children a safe option for trick or treating. Lambda Sigma members at PSU are leading the way in many aspects, and the chapter's president serves as great example for our members.

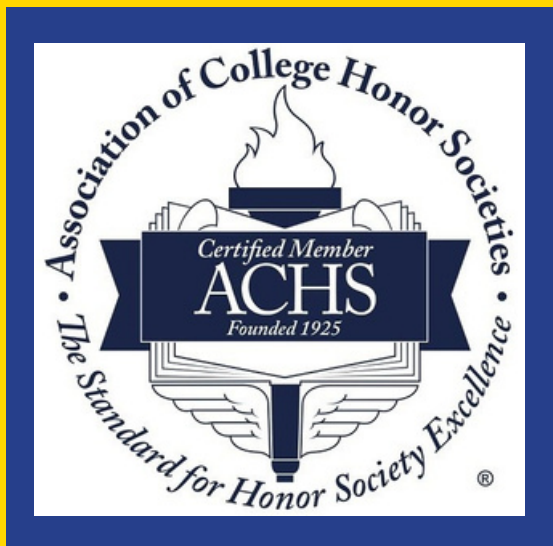

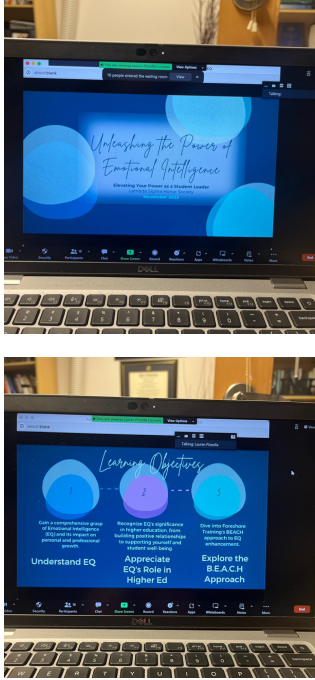
Mississippi State University

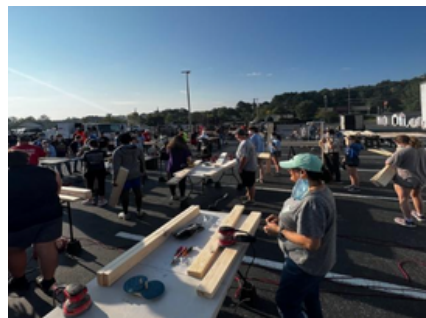
Berry College

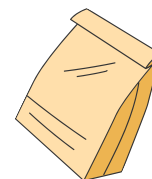
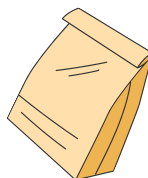
